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For those of you who know me, you know I have a strong belief in right and wrong. It has been the driving force in my life and that hasn't changed. Much of the controversy that has happened during the first quarter of this chess year is related to right and wrong.
Two major questions have been raised and will be addressed. We need to have a special membership meeting which will be announced on the $w w w$.ColoradoChess.com website. I also want to introduce some ideas that I believe will strengthen the CSCA and make us one of the leading chess state's in the US.
Is it worthwhile to bring a major national tournament to Colorado? When this question made the social media rounds, I was advised that every time this has been tried, it has been a major failure. I was also told those failures happened before social media and internet advertising. Bob Crume has a friend who is interested in bringing a major event to Colorado. I have appointed Fred Spell as point man to investigate this project.
Our regular membership meeting is held at the Colorado Open each year. Only a small group of the members actually attend the "business meeting". I would like to know what all our members think about the programs the CSCA is attempting to do to promote chess in Colorado. We are working on a method of voting that would allow everyone interested to voice their opinion. I believe this would be a better system than to present one that requires members to attend the meeting Labor Day weekend in Denver. Doing this will require we update our Bylaws. I have appointed CSCA Vice President Shaun MacMillan to head this project. He is interested in forming a "working group" to review and revise our Bylaws. Once the board has approved these bylaws, we will post the proposed Bylaw on the website and announce a "President called Special Meeting" to discuss and vote on these bylaws.
Now to the points of controversy, at the Membership meeting the board asked the membership to vote on a Tour issue that allocated money to the tour prize fund.
Our CSCA board serves the membership and is a decision making board. Boards have responsibility to the members, the state of Colorado, and to the IRS to manage, distribute, and plan for how the organization will carry out its mission as stated in the Articles of Incorporation and the Bylaws. Board members are responsible and accountable for the decisions that they make. Members can't be held accountable (required to pay back money) for something they vote for should it go wrong or be unlawful. Because of this, it is the responsibility for the board members to approve all distributions of funds. Serving on the Board is serious business (and yes, CSCA is a business - a 501 (c) 3 Nonprofit Business). It is my understanding, after much research and consultation with legal and nonprofit advisory groups, that it is the responsibility of the Board to approve budget decisions. In many nonprofit boards, employees (often called officers) build the proposed budget, which is then submitted to the Board for approval. CSCA doesn't have employees however the President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Junior Member are listed as "officers" in Article V, 1. The age restriction for officers is also included in this section (more on that later). Did you notice that the Member at Large positions (two) are not listed as officers? Later in the Bylaws the Board of Directors (Article VII) are identified including the two members at large and are referred to as Officers and Board members and tasked with carrying on all CSCA business between membership meetings. All of this seems confusing and trying to make sense of it and what was allowed and what was restricted for us as board members was very difficult to understand.
We discussed the vote that was taken at the membership meeting at length during the first board meeting. We believed what was done was wrong in some way but were not sure how. We tackled the question and after a number of false starts came to a conclusion.
As a group we didn't believe that allocating one third of the membership dues to the tour was a wise use of the funds. We were faced with a difficult decision. What do we do to change that decision? According to the Bylaws it is our responsibility to lead the organization in the direction that fulfills the Articles of Incorporation but the members present at the meeting had voted to allocate over a thousand dollars to a prize fund that could be viewed as a distribution to about seven members which appears to be forbidden in the Bylaws (Article X).
Some in the organization did not believe this decision by the board was right. They took to social media and went to various clubs to raise opposition to the board carrying out what the board believed were authorized actions. On the board we had many discussions on how to handle the situation. No one likes to be defamed in the press (facebook and Wall's Yahoo group) and the rumors of actions taken and not taken ran wild. Some wanted to impeach the board. Others only wanted to impeach part of the board and exclude their friends (even though those "friends" were in on the decision that was disliked). We held a town meeting with the intent of working together to solve the question about the tour; well that was the Board's intent. The dissenters had a totally different agenda. The board listened carefully to the members and guests who showed up and all were allowed to speak. The dissenters never allowed the meeting to get to the stated purpose of the meeting.

I was given a petition with a number of signatures on it by Chris Peterson. I accepted it without reviewing it.
After the meeting, the board discussed the issues raised in the meeting. We decided to fund the Tour prize fund at the one third of membership dues - the language used prevented the amount from going higher than one third.
Chris withdrew his petition after this board decision. Then I looked closely at the petition. It had only 17 current members' signatures. 20 current members' signatures are required to call for a membership meeting. The date of the board meeting where the "wrongs were committed" was also incorrect. I inspected the petition very closely and even discussed with Richard "Buck" Buchanan whether or not Chris had the authority to withdraw his petition after it was presented? I concluded since the petition did not have the required number of signatures the question was moot.
The second issue was that of the Junior member. There are Boards that are advisory only - they do not direct any actions or decisions. These are called Advisory Boards. I serve on two advisory boards. We advise the Salvation Army on issues affecting the local community. We have no decision making responsibility and no liability. Another type of board directs and manages an organization's activities. This describes the CSCA's board. CSCA board members make decisions and are accountable to members, Colorado, and the IRS. Because this type of board is responsible for its decisions, having a member who cannot be held legally liable for their decisions presents a bit of a question. There are laws that specifically deal with "minors" and their accountability. Another law that was passed in 2004 addresses minors serving on "Boards" without any reference to whether or not they were accountable for their decisions and also did not address which type of "Board" (advisory or directive) that they may serve on. That law also did not address the age of the minor. Part of Colorado law at that time referred to a minor as under 21, but now that age has been reduced to 18.

When our Junior member, elected at the membership meeting, was over 18 there was not a question about this issue. Our present Junior member is now 16 years old and is in his second term! Now, before anyone jumps up and down, Jackson is a fine young man and a great chess player. This is in no way any reflection on him. This is a question of how to do business for the CSCA in a way that cannot cause a problem with our 501 (c) 3 nonprofit status.
I consulted an agency that specializes in nonprofit operations. Other nonprofit organizations who serve youth (those under 18) have the same issues that we have. They handle this by forming a Junior Advisory Council to advise the Board on all issues that affect the youth.
The members who opposed this information did so by stating and restating the 2004 law allowing minors(at that time, under 21 years old.) to serve on "Boards"(without reference to type of Boards or minimum age).
I consulted legal advice on this. To get a definitive answer to the question, "Can an under 18 year old serve on a directive Board where the 'Directors' are also listed as 'Officers'?', would cost between 700 to 1,000 dollars. I deemed that was too expensive for our organization. Some will be willing to accept my work-a-round, others will not.
I worked with Jackson, he is remaining on the board as an advisor until he is 18 years old. Then he or any other Junior member would have full Board member status. So if the Bylaw is changed to something like: Our Junior member is a board member if their age is 18 to 21 at the time of the election. If under 18 years old, the Junior member will serve as an advisor to the board until they are 18 years old (or words to that effect).
The other part of this dissenting view is that there is a difference between Board members and Officers. Our present bylaws seem to mix the names board members and officers very freely. This will be clarified in the proposed bylaws.
If you have gotten this far, I trust you read to understand what the board is trying to do to support Colorado chess and wanting to move the CSCA forward. Your feedback is appreciated!

# Perpetual Check 

by NM Todd Bardwick

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When your position looks likes the game will end in defeat, it is important to look for a way to somehow salvage a draw. You may also look to draw if you are much lower rated than your opponent or all you need is a draw to win a tournament.
Of the different types of draws, perpetual check often offers the best prospect.
Perpetual check is a special type of threefold repetition where the player who is losing can force an unending series of checks. The player forcing the perpetual check normally falls just short of forcing a checkmate (which, of course, would be preferable!).
Usually when the player demonstrates that he can draw by perpetual check, his opponent agrees to the draw.
According to the Oxford Encyclopedia of Chess Games, Volume 1, the earliest know recorded perpetual check was between two unknown players in 1750.


Position after 14...Nxf3(Q)

White is behind in material and forces a draw by playing, 15.Ng6+ Kh7 Draw Agreed. White can repeat the position by playing 16.Nf8+ Kh8 17.Ng6+. 16.Nxh4 would lose to 16...Nxh4 because Black would be ahead a knight in material.

Here is an endgame position from 1925 between David Janowski and Ernst Grünfeld.

The position looks bad for White as he is behind two connected passed pawns. He did, however, make a key observation to salvage a draw: He notices that his king cannot move and is blocking his pawn. Without the rook, it would be a stalemate with White to move.

Janowski draws by perpetual check by trying to give away his rook by playing 60.Rd7+ Kh6 61.Rh7+! Kg5 62.Rxh5+ Kf6 63.Rf5+ Kg7 64.Rf7+ Kh6 65.Rh7+ Kg5 66.Rh5+ gxh5 Stalemate Black's king cannot escape the annoying checks.

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# The Rook

Alias: Chariot (The Persian word rukh means chariot), Tower, Marquess, Rector, Comes, Castle, Longship.
Number: 2.
Starting Square: 1st rank, a and h files. Motto: "We charge AHead!"
Move: Any squares, straight.
Capture: Any squares, straight.
Speed: Fast.
Special Ability: None.
Material Value: 5.
Mobility Preference: Open Files.
Spiritual Value: Patience.
Song: "Dirty Work", by Steely Dan. Verse:
"They charge like warriors; they scale walls like soldiers. They all march in line, not swerving from their course. They do not jostle each other; each marches straight ahead. They plunge through defenses without breaking ranks."

Joel 2: 7-8 (NIV)
Suppose one of you wants to build a tower? Will he not first send out the other pieces and lay a foundation with the most patient piece?
The king has a special role for the rooks. They start in the corner and wait for the king. While the other pieces may rush off to battle, the rooks will wait patiently.

> Like the castle in its corner In a medieval game
> I foresee terrible trouble And I stay here just the same
(Dirty Work by Steely Dan)
Since he will not move until the king is safe, he will stand his ground until his king is ready to build the castle. He can capture any enemy piece that gets in his path with lightning speed. He charges ahead as many squares as he wants.

However, he is first concerned to protect his king.
The rook will take on any mission. He will defend the king, he will lay down his life, and he will capture his king's enemies. But most importantly he is the first to surround the enemy king. More than any other piece he knows there is a time to build a defense and a time to tear down the opponent. How will you use the rook? You will have to play to find out!

Here is a position from my game with an up-and-coming, scholastic player, Atharva Vispute, where rook play was a key to the victory. See if you can find the best move (answer at the end of the article):


Black to move
The idea that "Rooks belong on open files.", is a simple plan, but it was one that I understood. So, playing Rb7 not only saved the exchange (trading the rook, a major piece, for a minor piece (bishop or knight), but also it allowed me to control the open b file. However, it was not the best move.
> "One doesn't have to play well; it's enough to play better than your opponent."

(Siegbert Tarrasch)
I do not regret not finding the best move in that position. I believe that simple plans you understand are better than perfect plans that you have to struggle to comprehend. They save you time and mental energy that might be needed later in the game.
Chess is a balance between the board and the clock.

The rooks are typically the last piece to develop due to the rules of castling. In fact, one can define the end of the opening (when development of the pieces is done) as the move that first connects the rooks.
Here Atharva moves his queenside rook and can only castle kingside. This allowed me to plan where to put my king and where to attack.

However, it is good to be especially careful about trading off that last rook because the rook is the minimal amount of material needed to force mate. If you cannot guarantee a pawn promotion, you may have just traded away the win.
